We need a few volunteers to help setup and all are encouraged to stay after the event and enjoy a meal made from the meal packets.

### Congregational Challenge:

**Can we increase the meals from 10,000 to 20,000?**

As in the past we have 10,000 meals in the St. Andrew in Mission budget, so we challenge the congregation to contribute to two special offerings on Aug. 4 & 11, so that we can increase our meal contributions to 20,000. Donations will be accepted prior to these dates should this prove more convenient; however, in order to provide a final meal count, all donations must be received by Aug. 11.

The cost for each meal is 34¢. This is a 5¢ increase from previous years, however we exceeded our goal last year and packaged over 22,000 meals. This increase should not stop us from hitting our goal this year.

## IN THE BEGINNING



*"In the Beginning", written by Judy Bander, is a continuing column, which tells the history of our church. Included are facts, stories, and "things remembered" by those who helped establish St. Andrew Presbyterian Church.*

### Easter Week 1991

Holy Week services included Palm Sunday on March 24, with the 11:00 a.m. service and the Children's Choir; Maundy Thursday with Holy Communion, and the Good Friday Tenebrae Service. The Tenebrae Service (first celebrated in the 4<sup>th</sup> Century) was held on Friday, March 29. Tenebrae means "darkness" or "shadow." During the candle light service, people were asked to come forward and drive nails into a wooden cross to symbolize Christ's death for our sins. Words for the song "Old Rugged Cross" were printed in the bulletin so the congregation could sing the cherished old song.

During the Tenebrae service, seven candles representing the last seven words of Jesus were gradually extinguished. They symbolized the fading loyalty of the disciples of Jesus. They also portrayed the dimming of the light of the world as Jesus suffered and died. The service ended as the last candle was put out signifying God did not spare his own Son in order to save his people from sin and death. The participants left in silence and darkness. It was a service long remembered by those who participated.

Easter morning had the Community Sunrise Service at Woods Point in Eclipse. St. Andrew had the regular 8:45 and 11:00 services. On the next Sunday, there was a note of thanks to the choir and Director Richard Barnes for the hard work and extra preparation they did to make the Lenten Season a spiritually moving experience. Easter lilies given in honor and memory of loved ones decorated the church.

August is National Immunization Awareness Month. School aged children will be required to complete scheduled vaccinations. There are others that are recommended for children and teens. Some additional vaccines are recommended when you travel abroad. Soon the flu season will be upon us and this along with the pneumonia vaccine will be recommended. There are several other voluntary immunizations and boosters you can get any time in your life. Recent events regarding measles outbreaks highlight the value of being immunized. It is a proven tool for controlling or eliminating life-threatening infectious diseases, and a cost-effective health investment. Good hygiene, sanitation, clean water, and nutrition are helpful but insufficient for stopping infectious diseases. Any licensed vaccine is rigorously tested across multiple phases of trials before it is approved for use, and regularly reassessed once it is on the market. Talk with your health care provider about any vaccines that would be appropriate for you or your loved one. A penny's worth of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Dear Friends,



*“When things go wrong, as they sometimes will,  
When the road you’re trudging seems all uphill,  
When the funds are low and the debts are high,  
And you want to smile, but you have to sigh,  
When care is pressing you down a bit,  
Rest, if you must – but don’t you quit.”*

*(From the poem “Don’t Quit” by John Greenleaf Whittier)*

This may be easy advice to offer, but not always easy to accept when you are going through the hard times of life. Giving up, throwing in the towel, or quitting can, at times, be very tempting options to choose. Perhaps we face times of disappointment, broken trust, hopes shattered, dreams blown away and our faith dealt a devastating knock by circumstances beyond our control.

When Jesus called the fishermen, the first disciples, he found them washing their nets. This is rather strange since, we are told, they had caught nothing. By washing their nets, the disciples were admitting defeat, they were giving up and quitting, tired of going out to fish and catching nothing. Into this situation of seeming despair, Jesus comes to the disciples and brings hope. First of all, Jesus asked to use their boat as a pulpit from which to preach to the waiting crowds, hungry for a word for their souls. Jesus took what the disciples had and put it to good use. Then Jesus speaks directly to the disciples, “Push the boat out further to the deep water, and you and your partners let down your nets for a catch.” The disciples thought they had done everything in order to catch the fish, and failed. Now Jesus was telling them to try again, to not give up or give in. It was then, at their lowest ebb, that Jesus came and helped them. It was only once the disciples had done everything they thought they could, and failed, that they turned to Jesus for help and allowed him to take the lead.

Perhaps we, too, are like the disciples. We rely on our own strength, our own wisdom, our abilities to face the demands of life and when life becomes too much we are tempted to quit. Recently I was diagnosed with Gullaim-Barré syndrome that struck out of the blue. It is a rare syndrome that can have devastating and terrifying symptoms. In my case it began with excruciating back pain that quickly led to paralysis in my legs, then my arms, mouth and throat, cutting off my ability to breath and having to be rushed into emergency surgery to be placed on a ventilator and to later have a tracheotomy. A few weeks in ICU was a humbling and frightening place to be, but also a place to think of how much we take for granted and how much we need God. Now as I relearn everything, longing for the day I can eat, walk and talk again, I am deeply thankful for the ways God comes to us through the love and kindness of others, as Jesus came to the fishermen and offered a strength and help beyond their own. As people of faith, we are called to rely on Jesus and his teaching that God is with us and loves us, cares for us and enables us to keep going, even through the most trying of times.

You cannot even begin to appreciate how thankful I am for your prayers, messages, cards, love that have sustained me and reminded me that we are forever surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses who keep the faith with us and for us when our own might falter.

I am also grateful that full recovery from this syndrome is expected, even if it is slow. Looking forward to a day in the very near future when I am back home in Virginia with you. Until then, find comfort in these words of the Psalmist that a pastor colleague spoke over and again by my bedside:

*“I to the hills will lift my eyes  
From where shall my help come;  
My help comes from the Lord, maker of heaven and earth.  
God will not let your foot slip  
He who watches over Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.  
The Lord will watch over your going out and coming in  
Both now and forevermore.”*
