





"In the Beginning", written by Judy Bander, is a continuing column, which tells the history of our church. Included are facts, stories, and "things remembered" by those who helped establish St. Andrew Presbyterian Church.

New Year of 1991 Begins

The 1991 church year began with **Rev. John (Jack) P. Ettershank*** continuing as our Interim Minister. **Mary Jo Hernquist** was our secretary and **Richard Barnes*** was the Organist/Choir Director. **C.H. "Red" Barker*** was treasurer. Church officers for the Class of 1991 included Deacons **Jeff Church, Hughie Powers*** and **David Saunders**. Elders were **Turner Coffman, Dick Klaas***, and **James Siebel**. Deacons for the Class of 1992 were **Ruth Downing, Kathy Pietrasanta¹** and **Helena Thompson¹**. Elders were **Robert Jornov***, **William Smith** and **Edward Ulrich***. Class of 1993 Deacons were **Amy Gray, Roy Holcomb***, and **Steve Suhring**. Elders were **H. L. "Bo" Bohon¹, Evelyn Jones** and **James Parker**. **Walter Jack Holladay*** was Elder Emeritus.

After the doxology, Rev. Ettershank added singing the fourth verse of a song Samuel Francis Smith wrote in 1831 called "My Country, 'Tis of Thee." The verse starts with "Our Father's God to thee, Author of Liberty to thee we sing. Long may our land be bright..." This would continue for several months.

A class in church membership instruction was set to begin on January 27 and continue for four weeks during the 9:45 to 10:30 time period. Interestingly, it was open to anyone and church membership did not have to be the attendee's goal.

Pneumonia can be a very serious medical problem, can even be deadly. Anyone can get pneumonia but you are more susceptible if you have COPD. Pneumonia is a bacterial or viral infection of the lung (one or both). Infection causes the air sacs to be inflamed, irritated and swollen. (Just like a reddened, swollen, sore throat; or reddened, swollen, tender skin infection) The symptoms of pneumonia include cough (that sometimes seems relentless) that brings up mucus with tinges of yellow, green or blood. You can have fever, increased breathing or heart rate, painful chest muscle when you breath, and/or overwhelming fatigue. You can imagine those with COPD that are diagnosed with pneumonia weaken more quickly and take longer to recover. The diagnosis is usually confirmed with a chest x-ray, and treated with antibiotics, lots of rest and plenty of fluids. If you, or someone you are caring for, is recovering from pneumonia at home it is important to take meds as prescribed, get plenty of fluids (more important than eating solid food) and lots of rest. Pneumonia makes you feel exhausted and it can be weeks before you get your strength back. In an effort to prevent pneumonia, those at high risk should get the pneumonia vaccine. The flu vaccine can help also as flu often leads to pneumonia. And wash your hands often, especially during cold and flu season. Consider the "fist bump" instead of a handshake as we greet each other each Sunday!

SOLAR POWER SYSTEM

A rule of thumb: in these winter months at the start of the year, things often aren't as good (or bad) as they seem! In February, we saw a dramatic improvement in the financial outlook from the month previous, despite extra expenses arising from the major plumbing backup. Of course, if you're following along, the reason things didn't look so great in January was primarily due to temporary errors in the budget (most of which have now been fixed) and various annual service payments that go out at the start of the year. As Whit Tucker mentions elsewhere, however, keep in mind that much of our excess income early in the year comes from people prepaying their pledges. Our income lines are projected to dip in months to come.

EXPLANATION OF PLEDGES

Things are not always as they seem. In case you were wondering why a significant number of members do not place offerings in the plates as they are passed during church services, here are possible explanations: many give monthly/bi-weekly/irregularly, some donate with bank generated checks mailed directly to the church, some donate later in the year, some prepay the current year's pledges in the previous year, some over 69-1/2 years old make federal income tax free donations from taxable IRA accounts. As of March 19, 2019, I have deposited prepaid annual pledges totaling \$60,093 for operations and \$16,330 for building/capital. While it is not bad to receive pledged donations early, it may give the false impression that we have much more income than budgeted. Of the prepaid pledges received for 2019, \$50,188.33 for operations and \$13,641.67 for building/capital are meant for the months of March through December. Please keep this in mind and try to keep your pledges and other donations current as the year progresses.

SUNDAY MORNING ADULT CLASSES

Several of our adult classes have updated their offerings for the latter part of our Winter/Spring session. Here's what you can find in the education building from 9:45-10:45 a.m. each week:

Challenge of Faith: Many of us have grown up with the idea that the Bible is a holy rulebook: follow the instructions carefully, and all will be well; deviate in the least, and there will be some serious smiting going on. The Challenge of Faith Class will take a look at a different approach to scripture using the book *The Bible Tells Me So* by biblical scholar Peter Enns. Enns takes as his guiding principle the passage from Hebrews 4:12: "For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart." The Challenge of Faith Class is led by **Steve Suhring** and meets in Room 204 on the second floor of the education building.

Jack Holladay: Jesus' disciple Simon Peter left everything to follow his teacher, yet struggled with doubt and fear. He was not rich or educated, but was familiar with hard work. He was quick-tempered and impetuous, but possessed a passion that would change the world. **Simon Peter: Flawed but Faithful Disciple** is a DVD/book study written by Adam Hamilton. This study will take place starting 3/31 and run through the end of the spring semester at the end of May. The Jack Holladay Class is led by **Curtis Corl** and meets in Room 206 on the second floor of the education building.

Faith Journey: Tackle one of the most influential and important books in Christian literature as you learn about **St. Augustine's Confessions** through a DVD Great Courses study. Professors William R. Cook and Ronald B. Herzman will be your video guides. The Faith Journey Class is led by **Harry Cross** and meets in Room 205 on the second floor of the education building.


