

Dear Friends,

"I shall be telling this with a sigh Somewhere ages and ages hence; Two roads diverged in a wood, and I – I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference."

Taken from the poem, The Road Not Taken, these words of Robert Frost strike a chord with many of us. There are times in every life when we are faced with choices, large and small. This poem argues that the choices we make shape our journey through life. Thinking about "the road less traveled" always makes me think about the path of faith. Fewer people choose this path these days, preferring to take easier paths that are known and familiar. The temptation is great to stick on the path that is safe and asks little of us.

As Jesus made that journey toward Jerusalem and the events of Holy Week, he too was faced with a choice of which path to take. The easiest thing in the world, and perhaps the smarter thing to do, would have been to avoid Jerusalem at all costs. After all, Jesus was doing good work, teaching, healing, and helping people, so why not keep his head down and continue with this ministry. But Jesus took the road less traveled toward Jerusalem, the road of sacrifice and love. The disciples warned Jesus against going to the place where many were plotting his demise. Jesus looked the danger in the eye and decided to go ahead and enter the city on Palm Sunday. The road from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday took Jesus to the Temple where he displayed his anger at the moneychangers, to an Upper Room where he shared a meal with his friends, to a garden where he prayed that the cup of suffering might pass, to an appearance before Pilate, to a heart-wrenching betrayal, to a cross and to a borrowed grave.

If Jesus had chosen not to take this path, we would know nothing of the extent of God's love for us, nor would we have the hope that the resurrection brings to our lives that death has been defeated and life-eternal a promise from God.

The road that Jesus took was the less traveled one; it was the road of love and the path to reconciliation between us and God. The question then is what road do we take through life, the road of faith or of fear?

Whichever road we choose, we are assured through the risen Christ that we are never on that road alone. Thomas Merton says it better than I ever could,

My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going.
I do not see the road ahead of me.
I cannot know for certain where it will end.
Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that
I think I am following your will
does not mean that I am actually doing so.
But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you.
And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing.

I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire.
And I know that, if I do this, you will lead me by the right road, Though I may know nothing about it.
Therefore I will trust you always though I seem to be lost And in the shadow of death.
I will not fear, for you are ever with me, And you will never leave me to face my perils alone."

At the heart of Easter and the resurrection, is the promise that we are never left alone for the risen Christ is with us on whatever path we take through life.

Both our year-to-date (YTD) income and expenses were below the budgeted amounts. However, our income is below our expenses by over \$7,000. Our current assets still exceed our current liabilities by a comfortable margin, but the trend of net losses is disturbing. The stock market declines had a negative impact on our endowment funds, reducing their total value by \$25,875.
