RALLY DAY: SEPTEMBER 10 WELCOMING THE NEW PROGRAM YEAR

Rally Day is the traditional kick-start to all the programs and ministries that have been on pause during



the summer. It heralds the return of CrossWalk Sunday classes for kids, youth and adult classes on Sundays, Youth Group, Kirk Night, and music rehearsals. It reminds us

that St. Andrew is a church in community with one another and at work in the world.

This year's Rally Day will be held on Sunday, September 10, immediately after church. We're calling it *More Than Sunday: Called to Community; Growing Together; Going Deeper*. With this theme, we hope to address the serious issues of loneliness and alienation in the world in which we find ourselves. We want to provide opportunities for the people of St. Andrew to dive below surface relationships on Sundays and get to know one another through the God who calls us into community.

On Rally Day, take some time to explore those programs in our "More Than Sunday Fair" in the Atrium right after Worship. There will be displays about all the Sunday classes, about our mid-week programs, and about other ministries of the church that are relational in nature. Dear Friends,

"Community offers the promise of belonging and calls for us to acknowledge our interdependence. To belong is to act as an investor, owner, and creator of this place. To be welcome, even if we are strangers. As if we came to the right place and are affirmed for that choice."

In the church, we often talk of being a "community of faith" but perhaps we do not think much about what that looks like in action. We are, without doubt, living in a time and age when being in community is under threat. We have become very disconnected from one another, fearful of those who are "other" to us and living within our own bubbles. This lack of community is taking its toll on us, leaving many of us feeling isolated and alone. Such feelings can lead to mental health issues of which we hear more and more. What is particularly alarming is how this is affecting our young people and leaves us fearful for them and for their future.

As Peter Block reminds us above, "Community offers the promise of belonging," and who of us does not want to feel like we belong to something beyond ourselves, to a community of people who care for one another and for the wider world. The church should be a place where community is fostered and where we are intentional about ensuring that everyone knows that they do, indeed, belong. And in the belonging we then have to act as the ones who invest in the place where we build the community. This investment is not simply a financial transaction, it requires more than money, it needs our giving of ourselves, helping to create a place where all are welcome, heard and loved.

Beginning our new church year in the fall, we are going to look at what it means to be in community. When we think of Jesus setting out on his earthly ministry, we may forget that the first thing he did was create a community, he called the disciples. Jesus did not have any desire to be a lone ranger, rather he established a community of like-minded people, with faults and foibles like our own. This small group of ordinary people, in the wake of the resurrection of Jesus, created a community of the faithful that still is alive and well today.

At St Andrew, we strive to create community and to invest in a place where all are welcome, where souls are healed and spirits are revived, where young and old can grow in their faith, where we can create a community where love dwells and where we are inspired to make a difference in a world that is too fractured.

KIRK NIGHT: ST. ANDREW'S MID-WEEK PROGRAM FOR ALL AGES; September 13 – November 15, 2023

What in the world is a 'Kirk Night'? 'Kirk' is the Scottish word for church, so 'Kirk Night' is an evening spent at church.

At St. Andrew, Kirk Night is an evening that includes a meal and programming for all ages. The fall season of Kirk Night begins Wednesday, September 13. Come for the meal, join us for the classes, or take part in both. Here are the details:

Dinner. Kirk Night dinners are provided by a different church organization each week. Check the church bulletin on Sunday to find the menu for Wednesday. Dinner begins at 5:45pm and ends at 6:30 when classes start. The cost is \$4.50 for adults and \$2.50 for children, with a maximum charge of \$20.00 per family.

Classes. Join our classes for elementary-aged children through adults. Nursery care is available for our youngest participants in Room 12 on the Preschool Hallway. Classes begin at 6:30pm and run through 7:30pm

For Children

- 6:30-7:00pm Music Makers Music Class (Room 14, behind the sanctuary) Children from Kindergarten through fifth grade can participate in this child-centered music program. Led by Music Director Al Reese, children are introduced to new songs, musical prayers, and instruments that are all combined in Worship to praise God.
- 7:00-7:30pm The children's **art class** this fall will be **"Portraits of Advent."** Each week children ages Kindergarten through 5th grade will create portraits of the major characters of the Christmas story, utilizing different materials and learning about famous artists along the way.

For Youth

• 5:45-7:30pm – **Youth Group** meets in Room 202 on the second floor of the education building under the direction of Youth Director Angie Hillis-Baurle. Middle School and High School youth begin with dinner and enjoy fellowship and learning together.

For Adults

• 6:30-7:30pm - Pastor Gillian's class: More info to come.

ADULT CLASSES RESUME IN SEPTEMBER

We extend a warm invitation to join in our adult education program immediately following the Sunday worship service. Whether you've been studying scripture for years or are new to the faith, we welcome you to add your voice to our conversations when classes begin on September 17.

All classes begin at 11:00 a.m. immediately after the morning worship service and meet in the church's education building, directly behind the main building.

Psalms: Passion, Promise & Praise. Psalms has been called "The Prayer Book of God's People," and author Don Griggs delves into how these ancient prayers still speak to us today. The Challenge of Faith Class will discover together that whether we're lifting prayers of praise to God or lamenting the deepest losses in our lives, we will find that others have gone before us and provide us words that speak to us and through us still. Led by Steve

Suhring, the Challenge of Faith Class meets in Room 204 on the second floor of the education building.

Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws. Each of the gospel writers tells the story of Jesus' life through a slightly different lens. Author and pastor Adam Hamilton explores Luke's focus on Jesus' relationships with people on the margins, and how he brought the good news of God's kingdom to those who most needed to hear it. The Jack Holladay Class, led by Frances Jornov, will learn how this word is still good news for us today. The Jack Holladay Class meets in Room 206 on the second floor of the education building.

The Wired Word. How do the ancient texts of the Bible have anything to say to 21st-century parents? The **Homebuilders Class** will engage with an event in the news each week through the lens of scripture. Rich discussions using these navigational tools will help parents find hope and direction in their daily lives. Led by **Heather and Kevin Gregg** and by **Karen and Mike Topping**, the Homebuilders Class meets in Room 101 on the first floor of the education building.

Rally Day, the traditional beginning to the new church school year, will be held on Sunday, September 10. Stop by the adult class table in the Atrium immediately after Worship to talk to any of the teachers for more information.

CROSSWALK CELEBRATES ITS TWENTIETH YEAR! "BUILDING GOD'S KINGDOM"

CrossWalk, St. Andrew's Sunday morning program for four year olds through fifth graders, will begin its twentieth season of exploring Bible stories with children this fall. In this workshop-based curriculum, kids spend three to four weeks on each Bible story, each Sunday through the lens of a different activity: drama, cooking, science, video, games, art, etc. By the end of each rotation, our hope is that the story will have become a part of the fiber of our kids' faith.

Our 2023-2024 season will be focused on the theme of "Building God's Kingdom." This fall we'll focus on the Old Testament stories of the Tabernacle, Solomon's Temple, and Esther. In the Winter/Spring sessions we'll look at the New Testament stories of Jesus in the temple, the parable of the sower and the seeds, the story of Philip's encounter with the Ethiopian, and the travels of Paul. And, of course, we'll look at God's promises through the Christmas and Easter stories as well.

CrossWalk begins each Sunday morning at 11:00am in Room 104 on the first floor of the education building. Classes for youth and adults also meet at this time. The first Sunday of class will be September 17. We look forward to having your children and grandchildren be part of CrossWalk!
