I mentioned last month how fast time was flying, and our journey through this season of Lent contributes to that sense of speed the closer we get to Easter.

I've recently picked up a book I started in the past but not finished: N. T. Wright's *The Day the Revolution Began: Reconsidering the Meaning of Jesus's Crucifixion*. It's deep reading that calls for pauses to think about and digest Bishop Wright's excellent points.

One particular concept that is sticking with me is Bishop Wright's description of sin, appropriate during this time of examination and repentance. He writes that "The human problem is not so much "sin" seen as the breaking of moral codes—though that, to be sure, is part of it...--but rather idolatry and the distortion of genuine humanness it produces."¹

He goes on to explain that the Bible promotes a "covenant of vocation."

The vocation in question is that of being a genuine human being, with genuinely human tasks to perform as part of the Creator's purpose for his world. The main task of this vocation is "image-bearing," reflecting the Creator's wise stewardship into the world and reflecting the praises of all creation back to its maker. Those who do so are the "royal priesthood," the "kingdom of priests," the people who are called to stand at the dangerous but exhilarating point where heaven and earth meet...[we are] part of earth yet reflecting the life and love of heaven...Morality is important, but it isn't the whole story. Called to responsibility and authority within and over the creation, humans have turned their vocation upside down, giving worship and allegiance to forces and powers within creation itself. The name for this is idolatry.²

Perhaps we don't think of idolatry as being a part of our lives because we don't worship a golden calf, but it's worth a deeper examination. Where is our "genuine humanness" distorted? Where do we *not* reflect God's love and acceptance? Where are we *not* promoting a life of *shalom* for *everyone* regardless of their skin color, socioeconomic status, lifestyle, gender identity, citizenship status? What can we do to reflect God's goodness and love and acceptance not only on an individual basis but on a community-wide, state-wide, nationwide, and global basis? These are the questions I've been living with this Lenten season, and I invite you to join me in exploring what their answers might be.

Switching gears: though it may seem invisible to you, the interim process is well underway. I am almost at the point of selecting five to seven members to form a team to conduct the next steps of the interim work: gathering information from the congregation at a granular level to evaluate your mission, vision, values, and what you want in your next pastor. As this process moves forward, I'll keep you updated here in this column and in the Interim Updates, which are online and also posted by the sanctuary doors (look behind the doors if they're open!).

In all things, be encouraged, and pursue *shalom*!

Editor's Note: Key points from Pastor Lou's "Interim Update March 9, 2025"

1. Pastor Lou's first 3 months have been a "getting to know St. Andrew" phrase.
2. The next step is to put together a team of 5 – 7 people who will meet regularly and set a strategy for gathering information from the congregation to discover what the congregation wants in its next pastor. This process will take us through the end of the year.
3. Once this team compiles the information, including demographics surrounding our church, they will create St. Andrew's Mission Study. Most of the information in our Mission Study will be transferred to the church's Ministry Discernment Profile (MDP – formerly Ministry Information Form), which is essentially the church's resume that will be put on the PCUSA system for candidate matching.
4. Remember to contact Pastor Lou with any questions or concerns.

Look for the full Interim Update (March 9, 2025 and future Interim Updates) on the table to the right as you exit the sanctuary or on the wall by the sanctuary doors.

Net (Current Assets – Current Liabilities) = \$220,790

St. Andrew experienced a net deficit of \$3,257 in February. Our endowment funds also declined in value by several thousand dollars. St. Andrew has decided to refinance the mortgage on our Education Building with TowneBank. We will be paying a higher interest rate, but since we have paid down the balance that we owe, our monthly payment will be significantly less than what we are currently paying. Our current assets exceed our current liabilities by \$220,790, and our only long-term liability is our \$405,063 mortgage balance. All in all, our church finances remain in good shape.

ALERT FROM PROPERTY COMMITTEE

In the past month there have been two separate plumbing backups which required professional services. One was caused by a feminine hygiene product being flushed. The second was caused by a wet wipe. Wet wipes may say 'flushable' on the package but are not! They are made of materials like synthetic fabrics and plastics that don't break down like toilet paper and can cause clogs in pipes and sewage systems. Feminine hygiene products like tampons and pads are not designed to be flushed and should be disposed of in the trash, as they are absorbent and can also cause clogs in pipes and drains.

These kinds of clogs create the need for expensive plumbing services.

Please Note: ONLY TOILET PAPER SHOULD BE FLUSHED IN TOILETS.

I (Sandy Poole) recently spent a volunteer day at SCFC and had a very informative conversation with Lorna Slaughter (see Editor's Note at the end of this article). Current economic situations are giving her many concerns. Food donations have decreased while more people and families are requesting help. In her own words:

"We are increasingly feeling the impact of the rising demand for food assistance. Some of the challenges we are facing are donations from the grocery stores often fluctuate, prices at the Foodbank in Norfolk have increased, donations from our partners and community abroad are challenged as there are other entities soliciting for the same items, and of course securing adequate funding is always a challenge.

Nevertheless, we committed to providing a reliable support system for those facing food insecurity.

Here is a list of items needed, this is not a "Buy All" list, just some of our most often needed items

- Mac & Cheese-boxed
- Noodles- any pasta noodle
- Hamburger Helper box kit-the generic version is just as useful
- Mashed potato bags
- Ramen-any flavor
- Oatmeal-preferably packets for teens/kids that have to cook for themselves---any flavor
- Cereal-same as above
- Shelf stable milk-same as above

- Peanut butter
- Jelly
- Tomato sauce--for spaghetti, etc.
- Sweet peas
- Fruit-canned or cups
- Canned Chicken or Tuna

We appreciate all the support of the St. Andrew Presbyterian Church."

The items listed above are in addition to the recent cold-weather requests (see below). Lorna stressed the need for **individual sized cereals** and other foods as might be available. She is aware of teenagers who are responsible for preparing food for themselves and sometimes younger siblings. The smaller individual sizing helps in those situations.

It is humbling for me to observe Lorna – and all of her staff – as they provide for others in such a loving, caring way.
